Message from the Presidents

In January, 2001 the Japan Center for Conflict Prevention (JCCP) (formerly the Japan Center for Preventive Diplomacy, JCPD) and the Japan Institute of International Affairs (JIIA) jointly published the "Directory of Organizations for Conflict Prevention in Asia and the Pacific".

We were pleased that the first edition of the Directory on its release last year was highly acclaimed in various circles because until then there had been no publication comprehensively listing NGOs and other organizations active in the field of conflict prevention in the Asia-Pacific region. Moreover, to encourage wider use of the corresponding website of the Directory (www.conflict-prevention.org) both JCCP and JIIA are continually making improvements such as the further development of the data search function.

NGOs are expected to play, and, in fact, are playing an increasingly important and significant role in a broad range of international issues as witnessed in the "UN-NGO Millennium Forum". Correspondingly, we undertook this project of revising and enriching the Directory which introduced NGOs and other organizations active in the field of conflict prevention in the Asia-Pacific region. We hope that this endeavor of ours will contribute to strengthening the mutual cooperation among them as well.

As a result, building upon the 290 organizations listed in the previous edition, data on additional 115 new organizations is included in this revised edition. Furthermore, included in this 115 and reflecting the shift in the international situation since September 11, 2001, are 19 new Afghan NGOs.

As before, we again hope that this Directory be used as a reference tool that promotes cooperation between NGOs and other organizations.

In closing, we would like to sincerely express our gratitude to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan for their support in the publication of this Directory.

Introduction

The compilation and publication of the revised "Directory of Organizations for Conflict Prevention in Asia and the Pacific, 2002" has again been a joint effort between the Japan Center for Conflict Prevention (JCCP) (Formerly the Japan Center for Preventive Diplomacy, JCPD) and the Japan Institute on International Affairs (JIIA). Furthermore, JCCP and JIIA acknowledge the valuable cooperation of the European Centre for Conflict Prevention (ECCP) and the Japan NGO Center for International Cooperation (JANIC) that both provided vital information on organizations in the region. The purpose of this Directory is to present information on NGOs, research institutes and international organizations that are involved in conflict prevention in Asia and the Pacific. Both the publication and website of the Directory have proven to be useful resources for parties involved in conflict prevention in the region and beyond.

1. Highlights of Revised Edition

Highlights of this revised edition are as follows.

- The first edition of the Directory contained 290 organizations from 29 countries. The 2002 edition is more comprehensive containing profiles of 405 organizations from 32 countries. The new countries represented are Myanmar, Afghanistan and Tonga.
- In the first edition there were 3 Afghan NGOs with offices located in Pakistan that were listed under Pakistan. However, in this edition 19 Afghan NGOs, including the 3 organizations from last year, have been listed under the newly created country category of "Afghanistan". Following on from last year, Afghan organizations that do not have an office in Afghanistan have been listed under Pakistan.
- The first edition was published in A4 format. For the revised edition, however, the Editorial Team decided on a compact A5 format for easier handling.

2. Editing

The information has been compiled and edited along the following guidelines. For last year's edition a list of approximately 1300 potential organizations from 36 countries including Japan was made, and the editorial team sent out questionnaires to all of these organizations. Of these organizations 330 replied of which 290 were selected for listing. For this revised edition the Editorial Team followed up any changes to the listed organizations, sent the questionnaire to many new organizations as well as to organizations that did not return the questionnaire last year. As a result of the selection process 115 new organizations are listed.

To make the Directory more comprehensive and useable not only NGOs, but also research institutes and international agencies have been listed. In selecting organizations to list in the Directory, as with last year a broad definition of 'conflict prevention' was used with all organizations, whose activities are at least in part targeting the various backgrounds to conflict, such as human rights, democratization, development issues, poverty etc., being included. Accordingly, not only organizations that target specific conflicts or conflicts in general in the nar-

row sense of 'conflict prevention', but also organizations that engage themselves in activities aimed at removing the causes of conflict and at improving the circumstances to prevent reoccurrence of conflict have also been included. Furthermore, international organizations were in principle required to have a permanent office established in the region. However, exceptions were made when the Editorial Team felt that the inclusion of the organization would be beneficial due to their significant contribution to conflict prevention in the region. Organizations that did not meet the above selection criteria were, though with reluctance, omitted.

In editing the returned questionnaires, in principle the profiles stand just as they were sent in by each of the organizations. However, obvious errors were corrected, and, where materials such as annual reports and pamphlets were attached, the information contained therein was appropriately incorporated. Some organizations replied that information be taken from their websites in which case the Editorial Team compiled those organization profiles based on their websites. Furthermore, in regard to international organizations that did not return the questionnaire, the Editorial Team as an exception to the editorial principle compiled the entry, and this is indicated by a footnote.

3. Directory Structure and Page Layout

The basic structure of the 2002 edition remains unchanged from the first edition. The Asia and the Pacific region has been divided into 6 sub-regions, namely, Japan, East Asia, Southeast Asia, South Asia, Central Asia and Oceania. Furthermore, within each sub-region the countries are listed in alphabetical order followed by the alphabetical listing of the organizations in each country. Where an organization is conducting multiple activities in several countries, the profile of that organization is entered in the country in which that organization is headquartered, or the country in which that organization maintains its largest office or conducts its largest activities. Those organizations headquartered outside the Asia and the Pacific region but conducting activities in the region and regional organizations are entered as 'Global/Regional' organizations. United Nations related organizations are listed under the separate "United Nations" section. Where a reply was sent in from a regional/ global organization's branch office/ local chapter, an entry was included under the country of the branch office with a page reference to the headquarters' entry and vice versa.

The layout of the profile of the organizations is in line with the questionnaire (see Appendix) that was sent out. At the top of the page is the name of the organization. The type of organization is indicated at the top right of the page. Each organization was allowed multiple choices from 6 options; ie, NGO, Governmental/Semi-governmental, Religious, Non-profit, For-profit and Academic. For the headings in the main text, (i. e., 1. Activities, 2. Activities of Conflict Prevention, 3. Services, and 4. Finance), each organization decided on what to write, but the Editorial Team supplemented additional information where necessary. The texts in "Description of Activities" were written by each organization, with minor editing as described above. Where there is a blank, it indicates that there was no reply from the organ-

巻頭の辞—両理事長より

昨年一月、財団法人日本国際問題研究所と日本紛争予防センター（旧称 日本予防外交センター）の共同出版として「アジア・太平洋紛争予防団体要覧」(“Directory of Organizations for Conflict Prevention in Asia and the Pacific”)を刊行致しました。

これまでアジア太平洋地域において紛争予防の分野で活動するNGOを網羅した出版物がなかったため、昨年度の刊行に対しては多方面よりご好評を頂いております。また、本要覧のウェブサイト（www.conflict-prevention.org）は、さらに広く利用して頂けるよう情報検索機能の充実を含め、日々改訂を加えております。

NGOは、「国連NGOミレニアムフォーラム」にも象徴されるように、多様な国際的イシューにおいて重要な役割を果たすことが期待され、事実、その存在意義は一層増大しつつあります。とくに、わが国にとって重要な地域であるアジア太平洋地域において「紛争予防」に取り組むNGOの活動を紹介し、こうしたNGO間の相互協力の一助として本要覧を編纂する意義は、益々大きくなると考え、要覧を改訂・拡充する作業を行って参りました。

その結果、本改訂版においては、旧版の290団体に加えて、新たに115団体の情報を追加・拡充致しました。また、この改訂版では2001年9月11日以降の国際情勢の変化を受け、アフガニスタンにおけるNGO団体も新たに19団体掲載することと致しました。

本要覧が、今後とも、紛争予防活動におけるNGO間の協力を推進する情報提供ツールとしてご活用いただけることを念願しております。

最後に、本改訂版刊行にあたり、ご支援頂いた日本外務省関係者に心より感謝申し上げます。

序文

冷戦終結以後10年間にわたり、紛争予防は、国際問題の多くの分野において一つの共通テーマとなっており、その重要性は広く認識されてきたところである。国際機関、政府機関、ドナー機関等をはじめ、グローバル、リージョナル、ローカルいずれの非政府組織（以下NGO）も、紛争予防戦略を活動の対象として取り組んでいる。

紛争予防は、それ自体が一つの分野として成立しているが、同時に開発、保健、ジェンダー、ガバナンス、食糧安全保障、難民問題、人権等の関連分野を横断し、それらと密接に関わるテーマとして次第に成立してきた分野でもある。事実、本要覧に掲載されている団体の多くも、紛争予防に特化して活動するというよりは、紛争予防を活動目的の手段として取り入れていると言える。全ての団体が紛争のない世界を目標としていることはいうまでもなく、紛争予防及び紛争予防と深い関わりを持つ分野へのより包括的なアプローチを試みているのである。

その分野横断的な性質に加え、特筆すべきは、予防外交の多様かつ複雑な“トラック”（tracks）同士の連携であろう。80年代中期以降から、マルチ・トラック外交が、この連携を表すキーワードとなっている。例えば、本要覧掲載団体の“The Institute for Multi-Track Diplomacy”は、紛争予防活動を行う上で、トラックⅠとして政府を、トラックⅡとして国際機関・多国籍企業に携わる団体を、そしてトラックⅢとして企業等を挙げ、合計9つのトラックを紹介している。これらのトラックが効率的に活動を行うには、トラック同士の連携が必須であるが、本要覧は、そういった連携を成立させるための触媒となっているのである。

紛争予防の最前線と言えば北アメリカやヨーロッパの団体がまず思い浮かぶであろう。しかし、本要覧に掲載されている多くの団体を見ると、紛争予防活動が世界各地に広がっていることが明白となる。紛争予防における、分野横断的な性質や、マルチトラックの活用の増加は、特に成長過程にあるアジア、太平洋地域における団体間の効果的な共同作業とネットワークの必要性を一層強調している。南アフリカの紛争予防団体であるNGO ‘ACCORD’ 創始者兼理事の Vasu Gounden の最近の著述もその点に触れ、「過去10年で我々が繰り返し学んできたことは、一つの団体だけでは現代の紛争を形づくる全ての利害を一致させることはできないと言うことだ。」と述べている。

日本では、「ジャパン・プラットフォーム」の発足によってこの協力的体制の形成が試みられている。「ジャパン・プラットフォーム」とは、自然及び人為的災害の際に、難民への緊急救援を効果的かつ機敏に行うためのシステムであるといえる。このシステムはNGO、企業、そして政府の3主体が独自の資源や特性を最大限に生かした上で、対等なパートナーシップを結ぶことによって実現している。このパートナーシップは、緊急救援の際、NGOがスムーズに救援活動を行えるよう、資金をただちに、かつ直接に提供するという点において、NGOにとってのプラットフォーム的役割を果たしていると言える。それらの資金は、政府の支援と企業や個人からの寄付により成り立っている。財界

は、経団連による「1%クラブ」を通じた、技術、機材、人材、情報等の分野への、一層の支援と企業の協力を公式に発表した。加えて、「ジャパン・プラットフォーム」への、公的支援の増大との信頼醸成のため、メディアや私的財団、学界といった関連団体の参加も呼びかけられ、それらが一体として国際緊急援助に取り組むことが期待されている。

9月11日の事件を契機とした動きの中で、「ジャパン・プラットフォーム」は、早急に難民支援活動を行った。さらに、2001年12月にはアフガニスタンからの27人の代表者を始め、日本のNGO、ドナー機関、国連機関、政府関係者等を集め、「アフガン復興NGO会議」を開催し、戦争で破壊されたアフガニスタンの再建プログラムにおける協力分野について協議した。この協議によって、アフガニスタンの紛争再発予防、平和構築の促進を目標とした実りのある協力関係が生み出されている。

テロ事件をはじめ、中東やアフリカ諸国などいまだ多くの場所で紛争が続けられている状況に鑑みると、これらの予防に尽力することは時間の無駄と問う人々もいるであろう。しかし、紛争予防なくして今の北アイルランドやマリ、そしてカンボジアはどうなったであろうかということを知りたい。紛争予防が成功するということは戦争が起こらない、言い換えれば何も起こらない状況をつくることであり、その状況はニュースとして扱われない。国際社会は紛争予防に取り組み始めたばかりであり、今回の悲惨な出来事は我々にさらに多くの課題を残した。しかし、日々、平和を目指して努力を惜しまない国際社会の様々な活動を、私は心強く思う。

最後に、この包括的かつ利用者の側に立った要覧改訂版作成に尽力された日本紛争予防センターならびに日本国際問題研究所のスタッフに深く感謝したい。そして、この要覧が、アジア太平洋地域で紛争予防活動を行うさまざまな機関同士のネットワークを提供するとともに、紛争予防の重要性を一般社会に広めることと確信している。

Description of Activities

The Japan Platform is a system to provide emergency relief to victims of natural disasters and refugees more effectively and quickly. This will be realized through an equal partnership of NGOs, businesses and government, with each constituent making full use of its resources and expertise. In providing NGOs the initial funding directly and quickly, Japan Platform will serve as a platform for NGOs to mobilize and carry out relief activities immediately; activities are funded through government support and contributions from corporations and individuals. In addition, in order to raise public support and accountability of the Japan Platform, relevant actors from the media, private foundations, and academic society are encouraged to participate so that they can come together as one entity engaging in international emergency assistance.

Regarding the Afghanistan issue, in August and September, the Japanese NGOs participating in Japan Platform sent missions to Northern Afghanistan to investigate the deteriorating situation of the refugees and the internal displaced persons affected by the long-term drought and the internal conflicts. In coordination with UN agencies, the NGOs crafted emergency assistance projects for the people in Afghanistan to survive the harsh winter. Due to the drastic change of the whole situation in Afghanistan from the September 11th incident, this plan was interrupted. In responding flexibly to the change, ten member Japanese NGOs, which are working closely with the various organizations of the United Nations, are now implementing emergency humanitarian programs in Afghanistan. An emergency assistance of this scale and speed will be the first experience for Japanese NGOs.

5. Description of Activities

August 2000 : WISCOMP recently organized a weeklong symposium on Human Security in the New Millennium. Participants represented diverse professional backgrounds and came from different parts of South Asia. The Symposium was planned as an effort to shift the terms of the dominant discourse on peace and security in a direction where the needs and concerns of people, rather than those of the state, are articulated. It sought to initiate a process of equipping young women and men in South Asia with tools of analysis on issues related to peace and security that are sensitive to the question of gender.

November 2000 : WISCOMP is currently engaged in organizing a Round Table discussion on the Kashmir conflict in north India. The discussants will look at issues of armed conflict, human rights violations, displacement and militarism from a gender perspective, and how women from Kashmir can be empowered to become agents of peace in the region. The discussion will also look at the gendered impact of armed conflict in the context of the Kashmir conflict.

November/January 2000 : Towards the end of this year, WISCOMP will also be holding a peace camp between college and university students from Pakistan and India. The overarching goal is to train the next generation of policy makers and opinion shapers of the two countries in conflict transformation, prevention and resolution. A peace builder from Sri Lanka will be invited to facilitate the dialogue. This training assumes greater significance in the context of the acceleration in hostilities between the two countries in the last year or so.

5. Description of Activities

PFML is a registered company but a non-profit one which has been in existence since 1989. It was formally known as the Foundation for Law, Order and Justice and is a wholly local organization. It aims to empower people and communities in PNG, Bougainville and Solomon Islands by providing training in facilitation, negotiation, mediation and community planning for development. PNFL offers its courses which are 50 hours in length to alleviate the breakdown in law and order and promote alternative dispute resolution especially with law makers and breakers, urban settlement dwellers and land owners. PFML trains Papua New Guineans to undertake this work. Its training manuals and courses are available in English and in PNG Tok Pisin.

Recently under new management PFML hopes in 2002 to expand its operations building a stronger presence in the provincial towns of PNG. PFML is happy to train others to deliver its courses as long as ownership of the training material and monitoring are agreed to.
